Introduction to the Theme of the Bible Readings*

Today's Bible readings help us prepare our hearts and minds for the arrival of Jesus. The reading from the gospel of Matthew reminds us that it is always good to be ready, for we never know when a guest might appear on our doorstep. Let us walk in the light, and get our house ready, in order to welcome the Christ child when he finally comes.

As we prepare to lit the first candle on our Advent wreath, the candle of peace, we focus on God' peace that surpasses all understanding.

Prayer of the Day*

God of peace, we lament the inability of human beings to seek and find paths of peace or to recognize a shared humanity and shared desires for safety, security, and a home in which to flourish. Give courage to those who show your love and compassion, and to all who follow Jesus seeking paths of peace. Bring the peace that passes all understanding into the midst of the conflict in our lives and the conflicts in our world. Amen.

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

In the reading from Isaiah, the visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace. Divine decisions will make war obsolete, and the worshiping community responds: "Let us walk in the light of that Lord now!"

This is what Isaiah, Amoz's son, saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. In the days to come the mountain of God's house will be the highest of the mountains. It will be lifted above the hills; peoples will stream to it. Many nations will go and say, "Come, let's go up to God's mountain, to the house of Jacob's God so that he may teach us his ways and we may walk in God's paths." Instruction will come from Zion; God's word from Jerusalem. God will judge between the nations, and settle disputes of mighty nations. Then they will beat their swords into iron plows and their spears into pruning tools. Nation will not take up sword against nation; they will no longer learn how to make war. Come, house of Jacob, let's walk by God's light.

Word of God, word of life. Thanks be to God.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

In the reading from Romans, Paul compares the advent of Christ to the coming of dawn. We live our lives today in light of Christ's coming in the future.

As you do all this, you know what time it is. The hour has already come for you to wake up from your sleep. Now our salvation is nearer than when we first had faith. The night is almost over, and the day is near. So let's get rid of the actions that belong to the darkness and put on the weapons of light.

Let's behave appropriately as people who live in the day, not in partying and getting drunk, not in sleeping around and obscene behavior, not in fighting and obsession. Instead, dress yourself with Jesus Christ, and don't plan to indulge your selfish desires.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

In the gospel from Matthew, Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of God will come unannounced.

The holy gospel according to Matthew, the 24th chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

"But nobody knows when that day or hour will come, not the heavenly angels and not the Son. Only God knows. As it was in the time of Noah, so it will be at the coming of the Human One. In those days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark. They didn't know what was happening until the flood came and swept them all away. The coming of the Human One will be like that. At that time there will be two men in the field. One will be taken and the other left. Two women will be grinding at the mill. One will be taken and the other

left. Therefore, stay alert! You don't know what day the Lord is coming. But you understand that if the head of the house knew at what time the thief would come, he would keep alert and wouldn't allow the thief to break into his house. Therefore, you also should be prepared, because the Human One will come at a time you don't know.

Communion Distribution
