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BE RECONCILED!!!

**All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; **that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. **So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled... - 2 Corinthians 5:18-20

A few weeks ago (back at the beginning of this month) my article began with the confession that I had made a mistake (about our designa-tion as a "Reconciling vs. reconcil-ed In Christ" congregation). After which I went on to

talk about how - even as we celebrated TEN YEARS of being a welcoming/advocating/supporting church *with* people of the 2SLGBTQ+ community - there was still plenty of work to be done.

Here as the calendar page turns again.. I need to remind you that this has also been a month of remembering & recommitting ourselves to the work of reconciliation with the Indigenous siblings we share this country/world with. For not only does June often hold Pride Week but so too it is "National Indigenous History Month" & holds "Indigenous Peoples Day" (June 21). And though we did not do much to congrega-tionally draw attention to that this year, we are to ALSO be committed to this work too (as an ELCIC & a "Reconciling In Christ" congregation). That emphasized openness is also included in our "Welcome Statement" each week. And as a national ELCIC church we have committed our churches to be actively involved in whatever stretching/transformation of our hearts & minds our country's commitment to that "Reconciling" struggle will call out of us.

The greater truth always being, of course, that the call of God.. the challenge of the Gospel.. begins with and ends with the demand that we "love one another" with exactly the same kind of colour blindness & the same transcending of every prejudice with which Jesus loves us. In the same way that each of us relishes & abides in the grace and care of God.. just so we are to be God's people/community where all people can feel precisely that kind of dignity, support, welcome and space to live their full personhood – irrespective of race, gender identity, or any other false designation that might try to create an "us vs them" among us.

As Canadians our relationship with our Indigenous siblings is complicated by far too many years of mutual distrust, prejudice and sometimes out-right oppression. In this case, these are wounds that simply "letting time pass" WILL NOT heal. It will call out of us all, both an incredible humility and an intentional commitment to compassion and learning. And here too.. the end of that work for "reconciliation" is no where near over.

My challenge for you this week.. as you make ready to head out there for vacation time and RE-creation time.. is to intentionally make some room in your plans/summer to expose yourself to some of the indigenous history that makes Saskatchewan the province it is – the good stories AND the bad. Maybe add a book about indigenous life in Canada to your reading list. If nothing else, take a few minutes to look into your own heart – to see the ways systemic racism has infected us **all**.. to face the blindspots we **all** have.. and then consider what it will take to move you from where you are today, to where you want to be.

For now.. I continue to invite you to "Be well.. Be safe.. BE HOPE". And indeed to BE HOPE is to commit ourselves every day to what ever love, compassion and reconciliation life calls us to!

OR you can drop off a cheque or a series of post-dated cheques to the Church during office hours (Tue-Thurs 10-3) or send them by mail.



A Medieval Experience of Our Eternal Faith

Through the use of games, activities, meals, and low-key teaching, this week-long camp will demonstrate both some absurdities of medieval life and religious belief, and the eternal truths and wisdom underlying some day-to-day activities of regular folks and in the church. Each day will have a unique focus (peasant life, chivalry, monasticism, nobility, and a 'quest for the Holy Grail'). In addition, it will examine the Lord's Prayer on a line by line basis, as a model for modern living. This camp is inclusive, and will have activities suitable for a range of skills, capabilities, and interests.

Camp Harding is operated by the Anglican Diocese of Qu'Appelle. It is situated in the center block of the Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park on the Saskatchewan side approximately 30 km southwest of Maple Creek on Highway 21.

Volunteers Needed!

In order to make our camp successful, we need your help! Can you spare:

a couple of hours? half a day?

a day? or more?

Do you love kids, crafts, story-telling, games, or cooking? If you do, we have a spot for you.

Here are the jobs we've identified:

Registration: Each day, a parent must sign in their child/children. On Monday they also need to sign the waiver form

Set Up: Setting up for the main morning assembly time. Getting the puppet show ready, possibly the screen and projector, microphones

Snack: Serving the snack to all the students and any cleanup afterwards. The snack will have been prepared.

Lunch supervision: Making sure the students stay within the bounds set for them, and there's no wild behaviour

The 4 Stations – each of these is a 45-minute time frame for whatever activity. The students will be in 4 groups of 12 each, and so each station will have 12 students at any time. There are 2 stations in the morning (10 – 10:45 and 11 – 11:45) and 2 in the afternoon (1 – 1:45 and 2 – 2:45). Each of the stations has a leader – we need an extra person to make sure everything goes smoothly

Story Station: Where the students learn the story of the day

Craft Station: A craft related to the story or the theme (Aprons, Chef's Hats are examples)
Cooking/Mission: Students prepare the snack for the next day. On the last day they make and wrap 200 sandwiches that will be given out at the First Baptist lunch program on Saturday.

Games Station: Games

Music: During the morning assembly time

Floater: In case a child needs some time away from the others, or isn't feeling well, or needs a Band-Aid, etc.

Cleanup: Making sure that everything is put away ready for the next day.

Before/After care: For families that need to drop off their children on the way to work and pick them up afterwards. The expectation is that this will be done by our preteen/teen helpers.

Adult Group Leaders: There will be 8 groups of 6 children each. Each group will have a preteen or teen leader to keep things moving along, and ensure there are no behaviour issues. We would also like to have an adult assigned to 2 groups so the teen leaders have someone to go to for help if needed.

Set construction: July/August (making a giant food truck)

Decorating: Weekend of August 19-21
