Climate Justice Notes

As spring arrives, many of us are turning our thoughts to gardening! One very effective way to help our prairie ecosystems by supporting native pollinator species is to plant some native wildflowers. It's easy to start by adding some native species to your existing flower beds, or of course you can always turn a patch of lawn into a native wildflower garden too. There are many sources of perennial wildflower seeds and plants native to southern Saskatchewan that will be hardy and live for many years. Normally one should choose seeds or plants grown from seeds collected within about 100 km of Regina so that you are using ecotypes suited to our climate. However, since we water in the city and our gardens are fairly protected from strong winds and coldest winter temperatures, we can get away with using seeds collected or plants grown in southern Alberta, southern Manitoba, or Saskatoon. You can choose plants by preferred habitat (dry to moist soils, full sun to shady exposures), the pollinators you want to attract and help out (bees – we have at least 350 native species, butterflies, moths, birds), height, colour, how quickly they grow and spread, and so on. It is possible to start native wildflowers from seed with patience and a sunny windowsill. Many need some sort of pre-treatment to germinate, for example, some time in a moist environment in a fridge or freezer. But some greenhouses grow native plants from seed and will ship them directly to you. I recommend starting this way and then plants you grow from seed can always be added later. I advise against starting with seed mixes of several species because it will be hard to distinguish them from weeds and you can get some fairly aggressive plants in the mix.
